Introduction

Many of the primary sources concerning Elsyng under Sir Thomas Lovell and the Tudor and Stuart monarchies are either not published or are only inadequately summarised in print. Indeed, this has led some to simply quote very selectively – often at second hand – from them which has led to some inadvertent misrepresentations of them. Moreover, considerations of space have not allowed some aspects of these sources not directly connected to Elsyng and those who lived there to be discussed in the printed text despite their value for the study of e.g. early modern Enfield and the functioning of both an early Tudor 'courtier's palace' and of the Office of the King's Works. Given the amount of work that has been involved in locating and transcribing these sources, not to present them in full for the use of other researchers would then have been to waste a resource created in the preparation of the volume (especially when their inclusion on a CD provides an economical way of presenting them). Therefore transcriptions of most of the manuscript sources not quoted in full in the main text, as well as some other items such as the wills of two significant vicars of Enfield and of employees of Lovell at Elsyng, are presented below.

The transcripts have been made by John Pinchbeck (in some cases assisted by Lesley Pinchbeck and with a few readings and one translation contributed by Martin J. Dearne), mostly directly from digital images of the originals (a small selection of which are included) taken by Judith Stones or supplied by the National Archives; and edited by Martin J. Dearne. However, the Description of the Funeral of Sir Thomas Lovell is as transcribed by Lysons and by Robinson,¹ the Funeral Accounts of Sir Thomas Lovell rely on a transcript of the original held by the London Borough of Enfield Local Studies Library (for access to which the EAS are grateful to John Clark) and the coferer's accounts for 1561 rely on the transcript of the Cotton MS published by Goldring *et al.*² MSS amongst the Cecil papers at Hatfield House are transcribed by John Pinchbeck and Martin J. Dearne from photographs kindly supplied by the Archive Assistant Sarah Whale and the authors are very grateful to the former Archivist, Robin Harcourt Williams for his valuable assistance in interpreting them. The EAS are most grateful to the staff of the Bodleian Library, British Library and National Archives for their help in accessing documents and to Paul Drury for assistance in obtaining images of some.

The format and text size/emboldening in the originals where they are sets of accounts has frequently been considerably altered both because it would not be practicable to reproduce original formats and to make them more intelligible and manageable. Some attempt has been made to introduce rather more standardisation between sets of repair accounts (though there are limits to how far this can be done) to make them easier to compare; and main accounting totals and subtotals plus categories of expenditure have been highlighted to differentiate them. In some cases it has also been necessary or desirable for clarity to render symbols not available in modern fonts with alternatives (such as a dash (-) for a symbol which separates the name of a palace or a class of purchases (e.g. tiles) from a cost or number purchased or a sequence of purchases of the same items) or to omit them. But as far as possible the text has been rendered 'as is' including crossed out passages, superscript insertions and corrections and without the punctuation that many originals lack. However, where words/terms are abbreviated, and the intention is more or less certain, omitted letters and sometimes words have in some cases been restored [in square brackets] to aid intelligibility.

Very long preambles (where they add nothing of importance) in some accounts documents, and sections of documents not applicable to Elsyng (where they include accounts for multiple royal properties organised by head of expenditure not property), have been omitted. Thus, folio/membrane number sequences frequently have gaps in them. Some documents are poorly preserved/damaged and where this has resulted in the loss/obscuring of text this has been indicated, as have instances where readings are uncertain (generally indicated by a preceding question mark) or differ in any published calendarings of the same document. In a few instances readings of elements of the same documents advanced by Gunn³ and by Paul Drury (pers. comm.) have also been of help. Where documents' overall condition, context or content appears to require some comment a brief introduction or note has been added to the beginning of the transcript.

Those less familiar with Tudor and Stuart manuscripts may find the very selective glossary included at the end of the transcripts of use, especially for items such as the inventory of Lovell's possessions and a limited attempt has been made (by John Pinchbeck and Martin J. Dearne) to explain some of the other instances of more obscure terminology, unfamiliar spellings and abbreviations, identities of some less obvious persons and places referred to, and specific issues arising from the documents, in footnotes (often just on their first occurrence in the texts); references in the footnotes refer to the main volume bibliography. Further commentary may also be found in the main volume text (e.g. p 303), though some points made therein have been repeated here in footnotes for convenience. However, it has not been possible to provide notes on anything like all the now obsolete terms in use, let alone much of the unstandardized/archaic English spelling included in many documents and only selected longer sections in Latin have been translated (in footnotes and in some cases in summary form).

Dates in most of the documents are given by regnal year and old style calendaring (with the year starting in March) and regnal year calculators are generally available on the internet so they have only been translated in a few instances. Most of the sources are also of a financial nature and of course use predecimal currency ($\pounds 1 = 20 \ s$; $1 \ s = 12 \ d$) rendered in Roman numerals. But the way in which sums of money, and quantities of all sorts, were expressed adopted (often inconsistently) some now unfamiliar practices (so that e.g. values are often given in shillings, ignoring that they amount to more than £1), use now obsolete abbreviations (e.g. ob or di = $\frac{1}{2}$; q (quadrans) = $\frac{1}{4}$) and they (and the way dates are expressed) may use multipliers often written in superscript (e.g. $xx^{c} lxi = 100 x 20 + 61$), while where the final Roman numeral of a number is an i it is written j. Cash values may also be given in marks (1 mark = 13 s 4 d) or crowns (1 crown = 4 s 4 d but after c. 1544 generally 5 s). There are though demonstrable errors of arithmetic in some documents (some of which have been highlighted in notes). Non-monetary quantification in some instances is very complex, sometimes now at least ambiguous or even incomprehensible and may e.g. use £ for lb or be expressed in quarters of a hundredweight (28 lb) or using c for either (depending on context) cwt or hundredths (= 100 or multiply the preceding figure by 100); though again some footnotes have been added where specific instances seem to require, and are capable of, explanation it has not been possible to do this in every case.

These transcriptions are followed by an index of the sections of the palace identified in the transcribed documentary sources, a note on a particular problem in identifying two individuals who may have played a part in the early formation of the manor of Worcesters and an archaeological site code concordance.

The present CD also includes (as separate files) re-evaluations of the 1963 – 6 excavations and 1967 (and 1970) gas main monitoring which publish these in more detail than has previously been available. Whilst basic accounts of their findings were published in 1984, these were little more than summaries and, not least because of considerations of space and cost, could not do more than illustrate a few of the more significant features. However, as the only archaeological interventions to date in what is likely to have been the inner court of the palace, fuller publication of these pieces of work was clearly desirable; while discussing the palace as a whole in the main volume text would have been impossible without providing more detailed accounts and critical appraisals of their findings than previously available. As will be apparent such reassessments presented many challenges and have to be tentative, while the considerable reliance that had to be placed on photographic evidence meant that it would have been impractical to include them as parts of the main printed volume. Yet by including them on this CD it has been possible to reproduce far more of the photographic evidence than could have been justified in a printed publication and to go into some detail about the strength of the evidential base for drawing conclusions from the records of the 1960s work.



N.B. The transcript does not include a few household accounts at f. 47b and f. 49b; several pages are presumed to be blank as there is no transcript reference to them (the *rectos* of f. 3, 14 (probably present but not numbered) and 24 and the *versos* of f. 23, 30, 31, 32, 39 and 46). The numbering of the transcript in some cases contains obvious errors and parts of the document have become disordered; as far as possible it has been reordered into the correct sequence and where parts have been moved this has been indicated by '[moved]', but the f. numbers in the original have been retained.

The document is calendared in L&P 4i, No. 366, but the calendaring is utterly inadequate and indeed misleading as the calenderers have incorrectly reorganised it, omitted swathes of it, moved or added headings etc. However, where L&P's readings differ from the transcript here (rather than are interpolations) they have been given in footnotes.

The 1524 Inventory of the Household Goods of Sir Thomas Lovell (PROB 2/199)

A Note on the Circumstances and Reliability of the Document by Martin J. Dearne

The inventory is quite poorly preserved, with loss to the right hand edge at several places and areas of extreme fading or complete loss of text, while it is probably also incomplete at the end. However, even in this state it might raise questions about the motives of the assessors. Some valuation discrepancies occur where one can actually compare the inventory's assessment with another from the 'funeral accounts' section on the dispersal of Lovell's bequests. In the wardrobe for instance were 99 coats of body armour valued at 5 s each (£24 15 s in all), 40 sheaves of arrows at 8 d each (£1 6 s 8 d in all) and 40 bows valued at the same. But 51 servants were each given 'harneysez as Cootes of Fense sakettes splentes standards bowe and arrowes appreysed togedirs the harnesynge of a manne' (i.e. a coat of armour, a helmet, arm guards, a bow and arrows), the total value of which was £30 12 s (BM MS Add. 12,462, f. 42b). This suggests that each 'harness' was valued at 12 s. In the inventory by contrast such a harness would be valued at 13 s 8 d (though it is possible that the excess represents items such as the helmet not being counted as part of the harness by the assessors). There may also be a few discrepancies in the totalling of each room (for instance the Green Chamber appears to be under totalled by 5 s) if these are not the result of damage to the document which is hard to read at many points.

But primarily one might ask why the assessors for the Archbishop of Canterbury recorded the majority of items as 'old' and great numbers of them as 'worn', 'sore worn', 'broken' or similar. Whilst one might take 'old' to simply mean not brand new, on the face of it the inventory suggests that most of Lovell's furniture, bedding, carpets and wall hangings (the major large items of value in most of the rooms it covers and the most significant items of movable furniture and interior decoration in a house such as Elsyng at the time) were worn out or damaged. This seems a little problematic for someone of Lovell's wealth and for a residence where the monarch was entertained until relatively shortly before Lovell's death and again shortly after it with no reason to presume that its furniture etc had been renewed in the interim.

Admittedly Lovell, as an elderly widower when he died and having already achieved the social position he likely craved, might not have paid as much attention to interior decoration and furnishings as he had as a younger man. But he had not stopped buying at least some new furniture (and perhaps panelling) as a bill for two new tables and stools, a box and hundreds of oak and elm boards (£2 12 s 9 d in all) from John Felde was outstanding at his death (BM MS Add. 12,462, f. 33b). Nor presumably were some of the wall hangings etc so worn as to no longer be desirable; sets of them were left to various of Lovell's legatees (NA:PROB11/23/9) including to his main heir the future Earl of Rutland, who still had eight of them (identifiable as obviously deriving from Lovell from the falcon's wings and true love knots on them, as on a priest's vestment he also still had) at least in store in his wardrobe when his goods were in turn inventoried on his death nearly twenty years later (Rutland MSSiv, 345 and 347). It is then pertinent to at least ask whether the assessors could have deliberately sought to under value Lovell's goods by 'downgrading' their condition (and so presumably the value put on each item). If they did one would suspect that the executors - ?specifically John Carleton – would have lain behind it in an attempt to undervalue Lovell's movable estate, perhaps to decrease probate fees, but more likely to mitigate claims against the estate.

Inevitably one cannot reach any firm conclusion on this, but perhaps one needs to treat the assessors' verdict on the value of Lovell's goods with a little caution. One might also note that the inventories of his Holywell and East Harling homes seem to have rather fewer instances of items being described as old or worn (though again numbers of items are so regarded at Holywell especially). Of course this may be because he used these houses less than Elsyng or because the furnishings really were newer – Lovell had acquired one and probably both houses rather later in life than Elsyng. But equally it looks like the three houses might have been inventoried by different people. Certainly the East Harling inventory entries are written in a different format to those for Elsyng and Holywell. Elsyng was clearly appraised by Richard Lane because Lovell's executors paid 4 s 4 d to hire him a horse 'to Endfelde when he came to make the inventorye' and he was paid an addition to his substantial fee for writing up the overall assessment (BM

MS Add. 12,462, ff. 28 and 32). Yet the inventory itself is attributed to William Geoffrey, his slightly less well remunerated (op cit, f. 32) colleague and to a John Seynteler (who one suspects was their junior). They though were not the only officials that seem to have been involved with it. Master Page, appraiser 'for my lord Cardynalle grace for his labour' was presented with a covered standing cup of silver gilt worth £5 18 s (op cit, f. 44). So the inventory was a 'team effort' whether any under valuation was involved or not.

Transcription Note

The original document was a roll now separated into nine sheets and in varying but generally poor condition (including missing sections on the right margins and large areas of complete or almost complete loss due to fading). The original joins between sheets are not always obvious, but on close inspection it is apparent that some of the sheets are now out of order and clearly something is missing at the end of the document. For instance, m. 6 as currently numbered can be seen to join the top of m. 3, and, though less obvious, m. 7 similarly fits after m. 4 and the headings and content clearly only make full sense once rearranged. The correct sequence as currently numbered should be 1, 2, 6, 3, 4, 7, 8, 9, 5, but here the sheets have been given a new sequence of membrane numbers to reflect the arrangement which the sheets originally had in the roll. The formatting of the lines in the original (two or more short lines for each entry bracketed to give a valuation for the item) would be very hard to reproduce here so each entry is transcribed continuously meaning that damaged areas of the text do not appear in the same position on the page as in the original.

Curly brackets { } indicate areas of loss in the original. Restorations have been made where they seem certain or very likely, but the length of losses has only been approximately indicated; and for valuations at the end of entries the amount of loss often cannot be established so no length has been indicated in many cases and a single { just indicates that the value is incomplete.

The Description of the Funeral of Sir Thomas Lovell (1524) From Lysons (1795) 192, fn. 67 and Robinson (1823) i, 130 - 7 = College of Heralds, Funerals, I.XI, p 82

NB Lysons and Robinson presumably made independent transcriptions of this source and they differ in details. The majority are simply in spelling and it appears that Robinson (if very inconsistently) modernised spellings (i for y etc) and probably restored or deleted some letters and standardised capitalisation and some place name spellings (again though very inconsistently) in the interests of comprehensibility. However, Robinson omits five phrases printed by Lysons and differs in his transcription of one or two more. On the other hand his transcription at a few points corrects obvious errors in the Lysons version and a few of his spelling differences may in fact reflect better transcription (though at one other point anyway he is surely misreading). None of the differences change the sense of the source in major ways though, so the text here is essentially Lysons' with a few letters restored [in square brackets] and the phrases omitted by Robinson underlined, but a few of the latter's readings have been preferred and where there seems to be a difference in the sense this has been indicated in a footnote. Footnotes have also been added where the sense of a reading they share seems to need clarification.

The enterrement of Sir Thomas Lovell, Knyght. In the vere of our Lord God 1524, and in the 16 vere of the reign of our Sovrayn Lord Kyng Henry the 8, the domi[ni]call letter beyng B, the 25 day of the moneth of May, beyng We[d]n[e]sday, and Corpus Christi eve, between 6 and 7 of the clok at afternoone, departed out of this transitorye lif[e] the honorable Knyght Sir Thomas Lovell, baneret, late Knyght of the most noble ordre of the garter, and conseller unto our Sovrayne Lord, at his place at Enfylde, on whose soule God have mercy; and after certayn space of his decease, was ordered accordyngly and leded²⁰⁹: wiche doon, he was brought into his chappell in the said place, havynge ev[er]y day certeyne masses with his service by note, as well masses as diriges, and ther[e] remayned in this manner the space of 11 days; and the 12th day, beyng Monday, and the 6 day of June, was removed from thens to his parishe churche, in manner ensuying, that is to wytt, Furst, the mynystres of the church; after them the chaplens of the said defunct; after them the Lord Broke, Ju[d]ge, and Sir William Paston, Knyght, Francis Lovell, and John Carlton, executors; after them the standart²¹⁰, borne by John Hevyn; after hym, the cotte of armes, borne by Ruge-crosse, and the banner of armes, borne by Martyn Cotton; after hym the helme and crest, borne by Robert Leche; after hym, Clarenceulx and Carlill²¹¹, having the Kyng's cotts²¹² on them; after them, the corps[e], in a chariot drawen with 5 horses trapped with black, and every horse havyng 4 schochyns of his armes, and the said charre²¹³ covered with blak clothe, with a whyte crosse of satyn, and beyng garnyschid with schochyns betyn in oyle on bukram, havyng at the two sydds of it his banner rolles of his armes, and his wyffis, thre[e] on eche syde; and within the said charre, within the two ends, did sytt two chyldren, that is to wyte, beffore sytt Thomas Lewys, and behynd, Richard Manners, eche of them holdyng a penon of his armes and his wyffes, the Lady Ros; and on the corps[e] within the chayr,²¹⁴ was a herse-cloth of blak velvet, and a whyte crosse of damask, and over yt a pal[1] embroderd of his armes, wiche palle was his own; and about the said chayr, at the foure corners, was borne by his gentlemen, four banners, that is to wyte, the baner of the Trynytye, by John Deryck; the baner of our Ladie, by Baldwyn Shirley; the baner of St. George, by Gregory Lovell; the baner of St. Thomas, by John Chamberlen; and after the said corps[e], rode the Lord Ros as chief morner, alone; after hym, Sir Olyver Manners and Sir Thomas Lovell, Knyghts; after them, John and Edward Lovell; and after them, two other mo[u]rners; then all the officers, gentlemen, and servants of his house; the said chayre and corps[e] havyng about it 40 staff torches borne by servants; and in this ordir²¹⁵ departed from his house at the said Enfylde the foresaid day, about 3 of the clok at afternoon, and in manner aforesaid, every man proceded in good ordre; and

when they were thus comen to the said parische churche, wich is dystant a good myle fro[m] the same place, where every one beyng in a²¹⁶ redynes, dirige was begon; and ther²¹⁷ was to do the devyne service [of] the Lord John Malyn, abbot of Waltam, and at tymes accustumed in the said dirige; Ruge-cross standyng at the quyer²¹⁸-dore, said thus: "for the soule of the noble Knyght Sir Thomas Lovell, Baneret, and late Knyght of the most noble order of the garter, and all christin soules pater noster;" and in the said church was ordered four gylte candelsticks with branchid tapers, furnishyd with schochyns and pencels;²¹⁹ wich dirige doon, with all other ceremonies therto belongyn, and the voyde was servid in the churche, as well of comfits, spyce brede, and ipocras, as of other things; the said executors, morners, with all other, went home again unto his said place²²⁰ at Envylde, wher they remayned ther that nyght; and the body in the churche remayned, wher was a goodly watch; and Clarencieulx and Carlill, officers of arms, were lodged in the said place,²²¹ and well entreated.

On the morow, beyng Tewsday the 7th day of June, the morners, with all the other, were at the forsaid parisch churche by 7 of the clok in the mornyng, where all thynges beyng in a^{222} redines, the masse was begon singing by the Abbot of Walt[h]am; and at the offrynge, the <u>chiese²²³ morner</u>, with the other, ossryd;²²⁴ and so the masse fynisched,²²⁵ every man went to hors[e]back, and the chayre beyng prepared and redy, sett forwarde to London, and proceedynge in manner as in the day beffore, came through the parische of the said Enfylde, Toten[h]am, Edmonton, and Hackney; and every parische aforesaid had for the churches, two longe²²⁶ torches, four²²⁷ schochins, and 6s. 8d. in money; and at the same Edmonton came for to mete the said corps[e], the venerable Father in God the Lord Cuthbert Tunstall, Bushop of London, the Lord of Saynt John's, Sir Richard Wyngfeld, Sir Henry Wyat[t], Sir John Dawnce,²²⁸ Sir Robert Johns, with manye other nobles and gentelmen; wher also did meet the prestes and clerks, the four orders of fryers, and 60 longe torches borne by poure men; and when they were sett all in good order, proceded styll on thourough the highway wich was by Shordyche-churche, untyll the gatts of his place at Halywell, wher stode on bothe syds the gentilmen of the innes of court, with certayn crafts of London; and at the gatt[e] stode the maior and all the aldermen of London; and when they were comen to the church doer, and every man alyghted from his horse, the corps[e] was taken from the chayre owt of yt; and ther was to ensens hym the foresaid Abbot of Waltam, and the Pryor of Saynt Marie Spyttell, bysyds London, and suffragan to the Bushop of London, havyng on their myters, and in pontificalibus; and when he was ensensed,²²⁹ procedyd through the body of the churche and the nonnes quyre,²³⁰ and so in the great quyre, where he was sett²³¹ under a herse, havyng five pryncipalls, 16 morters with course lyghts, rachements, syde lyghts, and other lyghts, well furnyshchid with pencells and schochins accordyngly; also there was under the said herse and the corps[e], a majestie²³² hangyng, over hit the dome, and at the four corners of it, the four evangelistes, and four schochins of his armes, one at the side, another at the feet, and one on every syde; and abowght the said herse was a valence fryngid, and with his word, Dieu soit loné,²³³ garnischid with his crest and bage, and hys armes; and when he was under the herse, dirige began, and all the clerks of London were ther to sing the said dirige, the wyche was solemply done; and in

the dirige, while the maior of London, with the aldermen, came and stode about the herse, rayles beyng spacious ynough from the herse hangid with blak cloth, where they said de profundis for the soule of the defunct; and that endyd, they went their way, and when dirige was full endyd and fynyschid, with all the seremonies accordyng, the morners with all other went home to the said place of Haliwell; and so rested the body within the churche for that nyght, havyng watche; and durynge the said dirige there was a drynkynge in all the cloisters, the nones-hall, and parlors²³⁴ of the said place, <u>and every where els in the said place</u>, for as many as wold come, as well the crafts of London as gentilmen of innes of court, havyng wyne, beer, ale, and ipocras, comfits, spice brede, in good ordre; wich doone, every man went home for that nyght.

On the morowe, beyng We[d]n[e]sday, and the 8[th] day of June, the morners, with all other, beyng at the churche in a redynes by 7 of the clok, was begon the masse of our Ladie, songin by the aforenamed²³⁵ Abbot of Walt[h]am, at the wich masse did offer, for a masse penny, the Lord Ros a crowne of gold, and no man els; the wiche masse fynyschid, the Abbot, with them of the guyer,²³⁶ came and buried the body in his²³⁷ chappell, under a tombe of whyte marbell, wiche both hit and the chappell were fonded by hym,²³⁸ and it stondeth on the southe syde of the quyre of the sayde church: and that service ended, the masse of the Trynytye²³⁹ was songin by the foresaid suffragans; and at the offerynge, the Lord Ros offered 3 s. 4 d.; and when the morners had offered, brought hym to his place agen, each of them offered 4 d.; wich offryng and masse doon incontynent, the masse of²⁴⁰ requiem was begon, songen by the Bushop of London, the suffragan, gospiler, and the Abbot, Pistoler; and when it came to the offryng, the Lord Ros offred 6 s. 8 d.; and after that the cotte of armes was offred by Sir Olyver Manners and Sir²⁴¹ Francis Lovel[1], Knyghts, and morners; and bycause there was nobler men in the lyverey of blak present then the other morners were, hit was advysed by Garter and Clarenceulx to desier them to offer the other ha[t]chements, wiche was doon; and after that all was doon and offred, they were sett on the aulter ende as accustumed, and then offred; all the other morners offred accordyngly; and next after them came the Lord Steward, E[a]rl of Shrewsbury, havyng the Maior of London on his lefte arme, and the said Lord Steward caused the said Lord Maior to offre affore him; after them offrid the Lord of Saynt John's, Sir Henry and Sir Edward Guldeford, with many other noblemen, and crafts of London, with gentilmen, and his own servaunts; wiche offryng doon, there was a sermond²⁴² made by Doctor William Goderick; and the sermond²⁴³ finisched, and the masse, at the gospell of Seynt John,²⁴⁴ when he said, et verbum caro factum est, the baner of his armes was offrid; and all things full fynyshid, every man went to dynner: and thus endid the ceremonies doon at the buryall of the most noble Knyght Sir Thomas Lovell, Banneret and Knyght of the most noble order of the garter - on whose soule God pardon. Finis.

Item. It is to be remembered, that the day that he came from Enfyld to Holywell, ther folowed a carte with ale and torches, for to refresche the poore people; and the torches were often renued²⁴⁵ by the way.

Item. There was every day whiles he was at Enfeld, 200 poore folks, and them that had pense apece, and bred and meat.

Item. There was said the day of his buriall at Holiwell 140 masses.

Item. There was servid that day, to people that were there, 400 messes of mete and above.

Throughout the accounts, payments are frequently annotated with variations of the very heavily abbreviated Latin phrase 'sol p. hubbarum' (essentially 'paid in full') which has been omitted except for a few places where it names who was paid (e.g. 'sol p. h. to hym selfe').

The Repair Accounts for Elsyng and Other Royal Houses 29th September 1561 – 12th December 1563

NB As this is a very long summary of the cost of works at many properties the entries for Elsyng (Enfield) have just been extracted (so sub-totals for sections are omitted) and where sections do not include entries for Enfield or are only concerned with accounting only the heading has been given and 'no entry' or 'omitted' has been added (this document's format follows the 1560 - 61 accounts' and preambles given there for items without an entry for Enfield have also been omitted here). Some marginal summary explanations essentially replicating headings included have also been omitted.

When the Surveyor of the Queen's Works, John Revell, died in post in 1563 his widow Alice and executors had to prepare accounts, including for consignments of brick and timber that he seems to have had through unofficial channels that needed paying for and so required special dispensation from the Lord Treasurer. A later part of this document is concerned with this, and includes a petition to the Court of Remembrance for extra allowances for the traveling and other expenses of the executors, but has not been transcribed here. However, it is notable that there are no entries for purchasing brick or timber ?which may partly explain the apparent problems with the total for Enfield compared to the constituent costs listed. In any event though one must strongly suspect that these are only partial accounts.

Probable Inventories of Elsyng 1597 - 1606

This inventory is amongst the Cecil papers at Hatfield House (Box D41). It is clearly dated 1606, but includes as its final pages one of 1597 which has evidently been copied into it. The inventory does not give any values, but it is glossed in several places 'wants' etc and includes memoranda of how it differs from the situation eight years earlier (the glosses have been shown in italics and are all in a different hand to the main text, the same hand as writes the 1612 inventory transcribed below, so probably of William Ockould or one of his servants).⁴⁹⁰ So it would appear to have been a 1606 inventory (with one of 1597 copied in probably to save reinventorying some rooms) later used to assess changes in the furnishings of areas of the palace – if it is of Elsyng.⁴⁹¹ How full the inventory is it is difficult to say; the intention could have been to record only the furnishings of some rooms of the palace, perhaps those containing items belonging to Robert Cecil (or maybe Roger Manners or both) rather than to the crown. Certainly it seems likely that the 1597 inventory is restricted to only the personal possessions of Robert Cecil, so it might well give some idea of the furnishings of (?parts of) the ?keeper's lodgings, as it is possible, but not clearly demonstrable, that it mainly includes three rooms, and just a few items at the end from other parts of the palace.





An indication of the more important locational information derivable from entries (or where an inference has been drawn or a structural detail is revealed) has been added, but to judge where something might have been it is necessary to interrogate the original source and often to cross reference it with others so this index is intended only as a starting point for exploring the sources. Documents are listed in date order (with those of c. 1524 and of 1541 respectively combined into single entries).

A note on the identification of Sir John de Enefeld and his son John de Enefeld and the wider de Enefeld families in the thirteenth and earlier fourteenth centuries

As has been noted in Chapter 1 there are many, often but not always demonstrably separate, John de Enefelds recorded in the London region at the right dates to be absolutely sure of the identity of the two John de Enfields who seem to have been key to the development of the later manor of Worcesters. The surname was clearly quite common in and around London, and in some cases more widely, in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries, often with little to differentiate what were probably multiple de Enefeld families at different levels of society. Thus, for instance, there was also a second ?separate de Enefeld family in Essex to that briefly reviewed in the main volume text at p 8 (note 53) who were based at Felstead, beginning by 1342 with a John de Enefeld who seems to have been the (?perhaps adopted) 'son and heir' of Robert de Plessetis (John died in that year, leaving a widow Agnes and had a son Robert who inherited his father's lands and immediately enfeoffed some of them to others).⁶⁵⁰ Whilst not claiming to be exhaustive, and focused principally on demonstrating the problems of isolating the two John de Enefelds who seem to have been involved in the genesis of the later manor of Worcesters, this note therefore gives a brief survey of some of the evidence for individuals named de Enefield mainly in the Greater London area in the thirteenth and earlier fourteenth centuries to illustrate the problems of isolating the de Enefelds in question.

Geographically probably closer than the Felstead family to the John de Enefelds who are of interest in respect of this manor, but perhaps at a lower level in society, there was clearly a John de Enefeld, 'king's yeoman' and later king's sergeant at arms⁶⁵¹ active from before 1307 to 1331 when he was given 20 marks a year for his service to Edward I, II and III, which had included escorting foreign dignitaries and churchmen visiting England, seizing the castle of Montgomery, making arrests and escorting prisoners.⁶⁵² It is likely he who was commissioned to raise and lead a force from Middlesex to Newcastle to fight the Scots in 1323 and is subsequently found making assessments of fighting men in the county in 1324, 1325 and 1330.⁶⁵³

Multiple individuals bearing the name de Enefeld⁶⁵⁴ in the City of London, may also be traced; and they include several clearly separate John de Enefelds one cannot probably entirely exclude as being John de Enefeld (the younger) discussed in the main volume text at p 8. One can exclude a few on the grounds of the date of their death including John de Enefeld a London 'chaundler' (d. 1346), husband of Margaret (d. in or by 1359) and father of Thomas and Elizabeth.⁶⁵⁵ He was probably the John de Enefeld, 'chaundeler' who in August 1327 stood surety for the Warden of the Conduit and so the John de Enefeld "living near the Conduit' in November 1337.⁶⁵⁶ However, whether he was the John de Enefeld mainpurner for prisoners in the Tower of London in September 1320, chosen as a safeguarder of the City for Chepe ward in April 1338, found contributing £10 to a loan to the king in 1339, the same year charged with collecting religious house contributions for the defence of the City and dispersing rebates on a loan to the king in 1343 is less certain.⁶⁵⁷ Even more uncertain is whether he is also the London 'cornmonger' elected as warden of the Grascherche and Neugate corn markets (1342) and Friars Minors (1344), made a guardian of the Walbrook (1345) and present at a Guildhall assembly in 1345,⁶⁵⁸ let alone whether he was the John de Enefeld

had held the office of sergeant of the customs in the City of London before his death in or by 1332, yet an obviously different John de Enefeld was appointed chief butler in the port of London and instructed to collect dues on wine in 1335.⁶⁶⁰ The likelihood is that at least two and quite possibly several John de Enefelds are represented here, one or more of whom could still just conceivably be relevant to the development of the later manor of Worcesters, though it is impossible to be sure. One can though exclude as relevant to the development of the manor (d. after 1349) two eponymous Londoners, a brewer and a 'grosser'⁶⁶¹ and others who appear to have been active at too early a date, including John (and Christina) de Enefend in 1276/7;⁶⁶² John, a goldsmith in October 1278 and son of David de Enefeud (granted dies in the mint of London in 1256 and probably d. 1260);⁶⁶³ John son of William de Enef[eud] in September 1281;⁶⁶⁴ and John de Enefeud (one or more person(s) who could include the preceding) in 1281, 1283, 1284 and 1286.⁶⁶⁵ But this leaves at least two more John de Enefelds just in London: Johanne de Enefeld in 1310; and John de Enefeld, spicer in 1342 - 4.⁶⁶⁶

Clearly then the surname was fairly widespread at least in London, where it is recorded as early as 1239,⁶⁶⁷ and obviously held by more than one family since we can also note individuals, often again with the same first name, but obviously not the same person, called Peter de Enefeld, probably a wool merchant in 1272;⁶⁶⁸ Richard de Enefeud, 'le heymongere' in 1295;⁶⁶⁹ William de Enefeld, a fishmonger and son of (??the same) Richard in 1311 (and perhaps the same Richard as recorded in 1308);⁶⁷⁰ probably a different William de Enefeld in 1259/60 and 1264/5 who might or might not be the eponymous servant of Poncius de Mora, the king's merchant of London in 1272 and or the envoy of Ralph le Blund of London in 1280;⁶⁷¹ Tettricus de Enefeud in 1277/8;⁶⁷² Simon de Enefeud in 1281, who might also be the Simon de Enefeld, arbalester (soldier) of 1314;⁶⁷³ Alan de Enefeld of Candlewick Street ward in 1275/6;674 Henry de Enfeld, ?apothecary in 1293;675 Richard de Enefeld 'fuyster' (fuster; a saddle tree maker) in 1309;⁶⁷⁶ a different Richard de Enefeld, apprentice to William de Enefeld, fuster (so probably not any of the Williams above), in 1311/12;677 William de Enefeld 'kissere' (who could be one of the above or not) in 1310/11;⁶⁷⁸ Richard (probably the apprentice just noted) and William (junior) de Enefeld, fusters, in 1322, 1327, 1328, 1331, 1333 and 1339;⁶⁷⁹ and Thomas de Enefeld in 1285), with another Thomas, pepperer/grocer and husband of Agnes – if all the same Thomas - in 1316 and 1320 - 28.⁶⁸⁰ (Plus (if the name really does represent de Enefeld) John de Evenefeld, pepperer ?son of Thomas (maybe the Thomas just noted), brother of Thomas, husband of (1) Dionisia and (2) Imanya, father of John and d. 1369.681)

Equally there were de Enefelds (perhaps related to, or identical to, some in the City or in Essex) in other parts of Middlesex than Enfield (Richard de Enefeld in 1264/5 in Gore hundred)⁶⁸² and who we cannot locate geographically (cf the Henry de Enefeld who was included in a general pardoning of Lancastrian supporters in 1318;⁶⁸³ and the William de Enfield who was pardoned for past crimes in 1336).⁶⁸⁴ Again, the full identification of these multiple individuals and their relationships is beyond the scope of the present work, even were it possible, and especially as the de Enefeld diaspora reached into various home counties with a William de Enefeld (conceivably the preceding) recorded in Buckinghamshire;⁶⁸⁵ one (a knave (*garcionis*)) at least visiting Lichfield in 1283;⁶⁸⁶ a John de Enefeld recorded in Froille, Hampshire (though he did die after 1349);⁶⁸⁷ and even a John de Enefeld holding a burgage at Berwick-on-Tweed in 1304.⁶⁸⁸ But the foregoing does demonstrate that the name is far too common to confidently identify and isolate the individuals who were involved in the early history of the later Manor of Worcesters.
